


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A WORD FROM THE CURATOR

The year 2020 and its changes to our "norms" also brought a chance for reflection and observation. To the artist Juliette Aristides, it allowed time to explore and document objects and the environment she lives in. In her new exhibition, *A Life's Work*, the artist focuses on quiet moments, documenting the light and shadow that filled her studio and home hours. The masterfully painted works in this show are timeless.


I believe Aristides is one of the best contemporary painters of light. Her ability to portray that bit of afternoon sun falling on a windowsill and reflecting on a pewter pot is unmatched. Within each still life story of softly blended hues the artist strategically places a rich impasto of whites, lavenders, and flesh toned ochres that give a subtle nod to impressionism. Interior scenes such as *The Atelier* bring out the artist's understanding of sunlight's dramatic effect on every-day surfaces - the reflective gleam that highlights the polish of a thick wooden table and the soft curvy silhouette of the stone sculpture that quietly holds its place on the side.

The figurative work of Aristides also exudes that understanding of light, with reflections cast on muscles and hidden shadows from turned gazes. Fashioned after the classical style of painting the human form, Aristides' subjects share one moment with the viewer in an unfinished storyline.

Whether it is a portrait of heirloom tomatoes or the hallway in an industrial building, there is a feeling of comfort and calm that comes across in Aristides' work. You are at once both awe-struck at her handling of paint and emotionally drawn to the familiar muse commanding center stage. The show is a visual essay celebrating our every day. One can feel the warmth in her paintings, and a sense of time standing still for one tranquil gaze by the viewer, drawing you into your own memories.





















The Space Between 28" x 22 %16" oil on panel, 2020




The Ritual16" x 12" oil on panel, 2020

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
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

Juliette Aristides, born in Cape Town, South Africa, raised in Reading Pennsylvania, is the Founder and Director of the Aristides Atelier at the Gage Academy of Art in Seattle, WA (founded in 2000). She teaches workshops internationally and is the author of six bestselling books including Lessons in Classical Drawing and Lessons in Classical Painting published by Watson-Guptill, NY which have been translated into six languages. Her artwork and writing have been featured in magazines such as Fine Art Connoisseur,

American Art Collector, Artist's Magazine, and American Artist. She exhibits in one person and group shows nationally including Observations, a solo exhibition at the Reading Public Museum of Art (2013). The Aristides Atelier achievements have been recognized in consecutive exhibitions at the Maryhill Museum of Art (2018, 2019, 2020, and in 2021). Aristides is the recipient of an Elizabeth Greenshields grant and is an Art Renewal Center "Living Master."




